#### **TAS Sport**

There are many reasons why schools offer sports and games. They provide an educational experience. They provide a sense of cohesion within the School. They provide opportunities for a wider range of experiences to be offered to students. They allow the School to be seen to be successful.

They contribute towards the building of character.

All students are expected to support the School and its activities any way that they can. As a minimum, students are expected to make themselves available for at least one major, or two minor extra-curricular activities per year.

Students, who are unable to represent the School in any activity, may earn Colour Points by: Umpiring, scoring, coaching, managing or assisting in any activity.

At St Paul's, coaches should expect high standards from their players at all times. High standards of dress, of conduct, of sportsmanship, attendance and punctuality at games and practices all contribute to the results obtained.

By following sound principles, teaching skills and developing fitness to appropriate levels, we can prepare students to play games to the best of their ability. It is not possible directly to coach for courage and bravery in the face of stronger adversaries, but if students have a good knowledge of, and skill in the game, they will do their best for themselves and their fellows.

Sport should be regarded as a component of a full and active life, not the only component. Students are to be made fully aware their academic commitments are of paramount importance. However, if they are taught properly to organise their time they will be able to fulfill their commitments in all aspects of School life. The students are advised to discuss their intended commitment to extra-curricular activities with their Tutor, Head of House and parents prior to signing up with a particular activity. Once a student has signaled their intention at the official sign on they are committed fully for the entire season.

A number of students will want to participate in more than one activity at a time e.g., cricket/swimming or rugby/cross-country. This is acceptable provided that they are able to fulfill all requirements of both and that the Head of House and parents feel they are competent to maintain the workload.

When the inevitable clashes between scheduled activities arise, students are to negotiate with the Coaches/ Teachers in Charge of the activities concerned to establish priorities and give advance warning of an inability to attend one or the other.

The School has adopted the Australian Sports Commission "Codes of Behaviour" for Students, Parents, Coaches and Spectators.

#### **General Information**

<u>Duty of Care</u>: It is the policy of the School to exercise the "Duty of Care" principle in all aspects of the School's activities. It has been decided that the following procedure should be in place:

Staff are to remain with the students if their parents are late, until they are fetched. Parents can be contacted via a mobile if need be by the coach or staff member concerned. This applies off campus at a School-related activity organized by staff of SPS eg. an away game etc.

Parents need to, however, be reminded of collection times for games / practices and follow up on parents who are always late, needs to be addressed directly with them by the Head of Sport.

Coaches and staff need to clearly communicate finishing times with the parents involved to avoid late pick-ups by parents. Careful planning and scheduling of time allocated for an activity needs to be done as it is well known that in practice that there will always be the odd child who has not been fetched at the stipulated time.

<u>Christian Ethos:</u> This is a Christian School and players should be Christian in their approach, developing a healthy respect for all opponents whether supposedly stronger or weaker. A win/loss record is not the most important gauge of success, but rather the attitude and behaviour of the team in the light of the players' abilities and opportunities.

Relationships between members of the School community should be characterised by care and concern for each other, whether staff members or students. Care and concern for others should also be extended to members of the public.

ANYTHING WHICH IS CONTRARY TO GOOD MANNERS, COMMON SENSE AND DECENCY IS CONTRARY TO THE RULES OF THE SCHOOL.

<u>Commitment:</u> Sports are to be regarded as a recreation, not as a vocation. All coaches are expected to support the students in their primary objective and commitment to their schoolwork, as well as to the wide variety of activities that are "co-curricular". It is vital that all: Coach, parent and student alike, see the activities of the school as a part of the integrated total education package that we offer at St Paul's. Consequently, it is expected that students and coaches in any activity interact in a manner that would be construed as a professional relationship.

With proper organization students should be able to fulfill commitments to a number of activities during the year as well as to their schoolwork.

Therefore, once the commitment to an activity has been formalised through the appropriate procedures, (which follow), you may expect the support of the School when you require such a level of commitment in your teams.

Parents will have agreed to the full participation of their sons/daughters in activities when they endorse the following procedures:

Students wishing to participate in any sport will be required to:

- complete an application form from the Sports Office.
- $\bullet$  have the application form signed by a parent and Head of House / Tutor
- return the form to the Head of Sport + Attend initial trials and training sessions

#### **Selection of Players and Teams**

Just as we expect a full commitment from our teams and their families, we have a responsibility to them, to ensure that everyone understands the policies of selection of teams. Please adhere to these guidelines:

- Where there are several teams in a sport in an age group, (as in Tennis, Netball etc.), the Head of that sport and the coaches of the age group will conduct trials. The "A" team will be selected first, followed by the "B" team, and so on. The Head of that sport will determine which coach is responsible for each team.
- If there are students who properly enrolled for the sport, they should receive priority over "late comers". When there is a greater number than can be accommodated in competition teams, names of those unplaced after trials should be passed to the Head of Sport who will attempt to organize intra-school competition for them wherever possible.
- The number of players selected in a squad for a higher age group will need to be agreed upon by the Head of the sport and the coaches of the teams involved, but failing agreement, a decision will be made by the Head of Sport. In general, where teams play at the same venue and at different times, a neat complement should be chosen for the "A" team so that the "B" team can be at its greatest strength and so that players are not kept as non-playing reserves when they could be given a whole game.

When teams in the same age-group play at different venues or at the same time reserves may need to be organized for each team. In this case, it is expected that no student who has turned up at the venue will be completely excluded from play, that even reserves will get reasonable playing time. It may be that different arrangements will need to be made from week to week, however, TAS Bylaws must be adhered to for all sports, especially Rugby. Players respect a firm and fair policy in these matters, and it is vital that team members, reserves and their parents know well in advance of the arrangements for each week's play. St Paul's is keen to foster the participation of all its students, not only the handful of particularly gifted players. The coach is to ensure that all players receive a "fair go" despite the temptation to rely on a core of stronger players.

Age Groups: It cannot be stressed too much that players may play only in their correct year group or higher for all TAS sports, and age group for all TAS carnival sports, as is allowed for in TAS Rules, and only in one age group or year group in a particular round of competition.

Each student's age shall be taken as at 00.01 a.m. on January  $1^{\text{st}}$  2013.

For all sports except Rugby, no student shall be 19 years or older at 00.01 a.m. on January 1st 2013 to be eligible for TAS sport in 2013.

For Rugby, no student shall be 18 years or older at 00.01 a.m. on January  $1^{st}$  2013 to be eligible for TAS matches in 2013.

That for all sports, allowance be made for a students age to be taken as at 00.01am on November 1 in the year prior to competition when it enables the student to play with his year level.

#### Other General Information

#### Parent Team Coordinator (PTC) for St Paul's School (SPS) Rugby 2013

PTCs enhance sports programmes at SPS. The School and Rugby Supporters' Group (RSG) place enormous value on PTCs. Willingness to volunteer for this position is greatly appreciated.

Each team will have one or more coaches. The coaching position will be taken by a staff member, who may be supported by a parent (current or past), a past student or an externally contracted coach. The coach is responsible for training and match day activities. A team may have a manager appointed by school. If not, the PTC may take on some managerial duties to assist the team.

The PTC's primary role is to **act as a liaison** between coach, manager (if one is appointed), School, RSG, team members, and their families.

#### **Correct Rugby Uniform**

All Rugby Players mut have the correct uniform. No player will be allowed on the field If they do not have the correct uniform – ie green St Pau's rugby shorts, green and red socks, Mouthguard and rugby booths (headgear is optional). For the First XV Players – they must Wear the correct white shorts, red socks, mouthguard and rugby booths (headgear is optional)

#### **Rugby Canteen – Home Games**

All teams must supply at least 2 parent helpers for the hour period before their child's games. Our Canteen Co-Ordinators – Kimberley Reed and Noel Paterson – will be there to introduce you to the other parents and to show you what to do. No experience necessary!

#### **Washing of Jerseys**

Your Team's PTC will arrange a roster for the washing of the jerseys after each game. It will then be your responsibility to make sure these are returned to the Coach at the next weeks game.

#### **Touch Judges**

Each team must provide a parent/supporter touch judge for their game. The opposing team will provide the other. Please contact your PTC if you have been a Touch Judge previously and are willing to be involved in your child's game.

#### **Arrival at the Game**

All boys must wear their formal school uniform (tie and blazer for Years 7-12) to the games each week. The First XV must also change back into their school uniform at the completion of their game, however all other teams may change into their St Paul's sports uniform.
